A Message from Rev. Erica Avena



In April, I had the joy of meeting with folk interested in learning more about what it means to be a member of the Niantic Community Church. One of the things we talked about was how a church community literally holds space for people to gather. And that it intentionally sets aside safe, sacred space. One of the participants asked me "how do you ensure that it is safe space?" I told her the truth which is that we make it safe for one another. It is up to us.

Does that inspire confidence? Do you trust your neighbors to keep you safe? It is either deep wisdom, or naive. Maybe both. Part of having faith in God, is being part of community, and having confidence in one another, in the gathered community. And when we fail each other is when we really learn this.

Last month my husband and I traveled with a group to see the Philadelphia Flower Show and some of the landmarks in that amazing city where our daughter is in college. One of the benefits I appreciate about traveling with a group is that I get to reflect on what we see with others. By the end of our tour, we had made many friends, and we even began having those conversations we would have otherwise avoided. I do not think I was the one who introduced the topic, but feelings about the upcoming Presidential elections came spilling out. Anxiety, mostly.

Rev. Erica Avena Message (cont.)

The person I keep thinking about in that conversation was a woman from the Midwest who was with us taking a break from fulltime caregiving for a relative. She said repeatedly, she didn't think she could cope with another election between Biden and Trump. What I heard in her words was that she did not feel safe in her community or with her family in the election season. It is ironic that President Biden and former President Trump will undoubtedly be protected by layers of security, yet the souls of many will be laid bare this election year, and no one will make it their business to protect them.

I believe that our faith community has an important counter-cultural role to play this year.

- 1. we can pray for one another, and we can double down on praying for those with whom we disagree. We believe that Jesus brings us together -- this is a great time to start living into that.
- 2. Creating safe, sacred space is a gift we give each other. This is not a place where our identities are protected, but where our gifts are given and shared for the sake of the world.
- 3. Our identity as people of faith transcends political divisions. While a life of faith may lead us to value some political goals over others, politics follows our faith; politics does not lead faith.

The holy spirit is giving us an opportunity this year. On the one hand, this year may hold some challenging moments. On the other hand, it will be easy to make a difference. Bless someone who isn't expecting it! It's the best kind of surprise.




Volunteer Opportunity Christian Education Ministry

Special Offering #3:

Immigrant Rights and Refugee Resettlement



On 4/2/24, I and some others at Niantic Community Church were sent an article from the Philadelphia Inquirer by another member of the church. It began like this:

"From the day in the mid-2000s when a then-20-year-old Maynor Yassir Suazo Sandoval crossed the border into America, he never stopped working. The youngest of eight children, Suazo was fleeing numbing poverty and a dead-end career path in Azacualpa, a small rural village in the western mountains of Honduras.

"The undocumented Suazo wound up in Greater Baltimore, a magnet for Central American refugees with its relatively cheap housing for the bustling Eastern Seaboard, a friendly climate toward migrants, and lots of opportunity. With American dreams of entrepreneurship, he took menial jobs like clearing brush, then launched a package delivery service, and when COVID-19 ended that, started working overnight construction for a Baltimore contractor, Brawner Brothers.

"Suazo and seven men with stories very much like his — migrants from the neighboring countries of Guatemala, El Salvador, and Mexico — were filling potholes on the Baltimore's major bridge on a raw March night."

We know the rest of the story of the horrible collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge. What we focus on with this Special Offering in May and June are the immigrants and refugees in the community of Niantic Community Church. What would Jesus be encouraging us to do in order to make sure that our Immigrant and Refugee neighbors are treated with love, or as Rev. Cathy Zall put it "a respect for the spirit"?

At different times through the coming weeks, this Special Offering will be focusing on the ministries of Church World Service, United Action of Connecticut (UACT), and the Immigration Advocacy Support Center (IASC) of New London. Our first Sunday of the Special Offering will be on Mother's Day with Blanket Sunday to benefit Church World Service. Next we will be focusing on IASC, and later, UACT.

This article from the Philadelphia Inquirer ends with the following paragraph: "Those six workers who perished were not "poisoning the blood of our country," they were replenishing it. This is a moment of clarity when we need to reject the national disease of xenophobia and restore our faith in the United States as a beacon for the best people like Suazo. They may have been born all over the continent, but when these men plunged into our waters on Tuesday, they died as Americans."

Faith in Action - Safe Futures

In 2024, NCC will be renewing their relationship with Safe Futures of New London. Safe Futures is a network of support for victims of domestic abuse. Last year they served 10,000 victims in Southeastern Connecticut. As the new liaison between NCC and SF, I would like to raise awareness of domestic abuse and to collect items for their donation center. Safe Futures will request a new



item monthly according to need. A collection container will be clearly labeled next to the coffee collection. The collection for May will be hand and body lotions. Thank you in advance for your support.

information. I learned that NCC is their ONLY

source of regular coffee donations. If they run out
of coffee, they do not have funds to buy coffee and

Narthex ceiling/floor

On Thursday, April 4th, with the help of my good friend Bob Cikatz we installed the gate. The gate latches with a magnet so in order to open the gate all you have to do is push on it. This makes opening it from a ladder very easy to do. It is not spring loaded so you do have to manually close it. I was able to find the leftover paint from the floor so the inside of the gate is the same color as the floor and inside of the walls.

This leaves the following items to finish in order to complete the project.

- 1) Install the outside panel on the gate
- 2) Build/install a new projector stand
- 3) Install the handrail in front of the projector
- 4) Contact the building inspector to get a final approval and closeout of the building permit.
- 5) Create/install the top panel trim
- 6) Install the gate threshold
- 7) Create/install the gate trim
- 8) Install the end trim for the bottom of the panels in the sanctuary
- 9) Create/install the post tops.

PRESIDENT/VICE PRESIDENT OFFICE HOURS






ANSWERS

If you guessed "A" to both questions you are correct. We paid Lillian Clark \$2,000 a year for 3 years for the Penn Ave. site. It actually only cost \$500 to take the Methodist Church down as we sold

one of the furnaces for \$150. We sold the Methodist Chapel and land behind the Church for \$6,000.

The 3 other sites considered were 1) Penn Ave across the street from the present church where PennCove Rd. now is. 2) The Cutillo property on the corner of Penn Ave. and Hope St. 3) The Bond property on Main St., the site today of Casablanca Wicker, across from the Baptist Church. Can you imagine Sunday morning on Main St. if we would have chosen the Bond property...4 churches within a block!
